

My eyes bug out of my head. No way that was Johnny. That's impossible. Johnny was fifty pounds heavier and a foot shorter. Not a chance that was Johnny. Robyn smiles and says, *"That was Johnny. He looks good. Family is doing really well. They are eating properly. A great support network and the worry of affordable housing has disappeared."* Before I left the school, I saw Johnny again. "Johnny," I cried out, "What has happened? I didn't even recognize you?" "I'm growing up!"


It's inevitable. Kids grow. They eat food and sleep. They participate in the game of life and inevitably they grow up and it might just be they become unrecognizable. I found an old picture from twenty years ago. Something has happened to me. I weigh more. I look more middle-age than what I care to admit. I don't look the same as I did twenty years ago. When I saw that picture from twenty years ago, it's hard for me to imagine looking the way I did.

It's really easy to be churches that think we are failing in all sorts of categories. Dwindling budgets, fewer people participating in the worshiping life of the church, lack of volunteers, no or very few young people in our churches. This list can be expanded in any number of ways and as result, the church can feel a sense of fatigue and failure.

When this happens, my fear is that we begin to act on our own accord. We begin to talk about what **we** must do; about our **own** actions. And don't get me wrong, we must do something. But I am convinced that the future of God's in-breaking kingdom is not on account of what you or I do. The future of God's in-breaking kingdom is dependent upon the redemptive activity of God in our midst.

If the future of God's in-breaking kingdom is dependent upon God's redemptive activity, then I think the church can breathe. We can relax. We can loosen our grip on everything that we are grasping and trust that God will work everything out. And yes, some of our churches will not do or accomplish what they hope or what they dream about, and that's okay. Because the in-breaking kingdom of God is not dependent upon the success of our churches; it's dependent upon God.

Which is why I have really liked Matthew's telling of the parables of God's kingdom (Matthew 13).



The kingdom of God is like . . .

- Someone who sowed good seed in their field but while everybody was asleep, someone came and sowed weeds in the field. When the seeds germinated, both the weeds and the seeds of the kingdom grew up alongside each other. The servants were confused because only good seed was sown. Where did the weeds come from? The owner of the field wasn't too concerned and said, "Let both grow together until the harvest. When it's harvest time, I'll have the reapers gather the weeds and burn them. Then only the wheat will be left."
- Someone planted a single mustard seed. It's one of the smallest seeds but when it has grown, it becomes one of the greatest shrubs and it becomes a tree

It can certainly feel like God's kingdom is struggling to take root. It feels as if there is more war than peace, hatred than love, retribution than reconciliation and more darkness than light. We feel this deep inside our bones. But remember . . . God's kingdom will arrive in its fullness. God's kingdom will reign. God's work of peace, love, and forgiveness will take root and will grow until there is a new heavens and a new earth.


God is not finished his redemptive work in our midst. So take heart and know that in time, God's kingdom will reign. God's desires and dreams will be fulfilled. The future of God's kingdom is not dependent upon what you or I do; it's dependent upon God's faithfulness and God's desire to act in this world. This gives me hope!
